We will have several more Members by the time of the AGM on March 18. I encourage you to join that group and become an iNADO Member as early in 2013 as possible. This will increase iNADO's influence and broaden efforts to share best practices and to raise standards.

2013 iNADO AGM and Work Sessions, March 18

Our first AGM and Work Sessions will take place Monday March 18, 2013, in Lausanne, Switzerland, the day before the WADA ADO Symposium. The day will be open to existing iNADO members, and to non-member NADOs and to RADOs as observers. The day will include Work Sessions free of charge to iNADO Members, and at a fee to non-members. Non-members will be charged €100 for the first participant, and €50 for each additional participant. Already, there are fifty participants from 26 NADOs or RADOs registered to attend.



The venue is the Hotel Alpha-Palmiers, Rue Du Petit Chene 34, 1003 Lausanne, T. +41 21 55 55 999, F. +41 21 55 55 998, E-Mail: alpha@fassbindhotels.com. It is just north of the Central Station, convenient to the Lausanne Metro.

- The day will begin in the morning (at approximately 09h30) with Work Sessions focusing on iNADO, on demonstrations of important anti-doping resources, and on a review of outstanding Code and International Standards issues after the closing of the current Comment Phase.
- There will be a strategic lunch session open **only** to iNADO Member CEOs/COOs/Board members. The tentative topic is "Show Me the Money: How to Engage Government Funders and Develop New Sources of Income." Other participates will be welcome to take lunch with each other at their own cost.
- The afternoon for all will begin with lessons learned from the Lance Armstrong case (the case that keeps on giving).
- We will also have a demonstration by Antidoping Switzerland, DFSNZ and USADA of the "paperless" doping control system they have begun to use.
- The AGM itself will complete that day. It will focus on minor changes to iNADO's Articles of
 Association (including increasing the number of seats on the Board from 6 to 8), and elections
 for iNADO's first elected Board of Directors. The members of the current start-up Board will
 step down, although many may stand for election. Observers will be welcome for the first half
 of the meeting, including the presentation of iNADO's positive financial situation. It will be
 Members-only for the consideration of changes to the Articles of Association and elections for
 the Board of Directors.

Doping, Match Fixing and Organised Crime in Australia

This morning I received the following message from Aurora Andruska, CEO of ASADA. It relates to a major government report exposing doping in professional sport leagues (or "Codes") and the links between doping, match fixing and organised crime. Because of its significance, I repeat Aurora's message in full. This is another example of the importance of NADOs having active connections with government authorities to be able to address all aspects of doping.

Dear iNADO Colleagues

Today I issued an advisory to Australia's sporting community following the release of a report by the Australian Crime Commission that details the links between organised crime and doping and match-fixing activities in Australia.

We have been working with the Australian Crime Commission for over 12 months, and our investigations are ongoing. We have a huge amount of work ahead of us, investigating many



individuals across many sports, and I am gratified by the partnerships that ASADA has developed with our law enforcement agencies.

The Australian Parliament will shortly consider amending legislation that will empower ASADA to compel witnesses to attend interviews, provide information and documentation; or face civil penalties. These new powers will support our investigative and intelligence activities.

URGENT ADVISORY

Today the Minister for Sport and the Minister for Justice and Home Affairs released the <u>findings</u> of an investigation conducted by the Australian Crime Commission (ACC) with the support of ASADA and the Therapeutic Goods Administration.

The 12-month project originated on the back of a <u>2011 report</u> by the ACC that highlighted threats to the integrity of professional sport and subsequent information from ASADA which suggested a potential threat to a number of sports from the use of a new generation of Performance and Image Enhancing Drugs, known collectively as peptides and hormones.

Through the project the ACC has identified widespread use of Performance and Image Enhancing Drugs in some sports in Australia. The peptides and hormones in question are prohibited substances in sport and are being used by athletes in Australia. In some instances, the substances are not yet approved for human use.

The ACC has identified that organised crime identities and groups are involved in the domestic distribution of Performance and Image Enhancing Drugs (including peptides and hormones). The project revealed significant integrity concerns within sports in Australia related to the use of prohibited substances by athletes and increasing associations of concern between professional athletes and criminal identities.

Based on the ACC's assessment it would be correct to say that what we potentially face is an operation that poses a significant threat to the integrity of sport in Australia and Australia's international reputation. It also provides an important opportunity for Government, regulatory bodies and the sporting industry to address the issues head on.

ASADA has commenced an investigation of the sports for possible anti-doping rule violations. The investigation is complex and wide ranging. However, we anticipate that legislative changes to ASADA's functions (currently before Parliament) will assist the investigation. While ASADA undergoes this process, its policy is to not talk or speculate about individuals as Australian legislation ensures that an athlete or support person has their privacy protected while a matter is being reviewed.



If our investigation uncovers information pertaining to your organisation, we will approach you and request your full cooperation and that of your staff, athletes and support personnel.

For the time being I seek your support in dealing with the difficult and uncertain times ahead.
