IN THE MATTER OF ANTI-DOPING RULE VIOLATIONS BY JAIME PAREDES (CHILE) (THE "PLAYER") CONTRARY TO REGULATION 21 OF THE WORLD RUGBY ANTI-DOPING RULES (THE "RULES")

Reasoned Decision¹

- [1] The Player underwent an Out of Competition² Doping Control on 14 August 2022 as part of his involvement in the U20s Canada Conference in Guelph, Ontario, Canada conducted under the Testing Authority of World Rugby.
- [2] The Player's urine sample was sent to the WADA Accredited Laboratory (the Laboratoire de contrôle du dopage) in Montreal, Quebec, Canada for analysis and on 12 September 2022 returned an Adverse Analytical Finding ("AAF") two metabolites of Oxandrolone (17 β -hydroxymethyl-17 α -methyl-18-nor-2-oxa-5 α -androsta-13-en-3-one and 17 α -hydroxymethyl-17 β -methyl-18-nor-2-oxa-5 α -androsta-13-en-3-one) (Oxandrolone).
- [3] Oxandrolone is classified as a non-Specified Substance under S1.1 Anabolic Androgenic Steroids of the WADA 2022 Prohibited List.
- [4] The Player did not have a Therapeutic Use Exemption approving the use of the Prohibited Substance to treat a legitimate medical condition.
- [5] The Player was notified by World Rugby, the Anti-Doping Organisation with Results Management Authority, of the AAF and his Provisional Suspension by letter on 15 September 2022.
- [6] The Player's B Sample was analysed on his request and, on 10 November 2022, it was confirmed to World Rugby that the B Sample had also returned an AAF and confirmed the A Sample result.
- [7] On 27 October 2022 the Player offered a written explanation in which he explained that he was not aware of having consumed Oxandrolone or any other Prohibited Substance and that one possible explanation for the AAF was his prior use of a dietary supplement called "Animal Stak".
- [8] World Rugby therefore deemed it appropriate under the Rules and the WADA International Standard for Results Management to commence proceedings against the Player. There was no departure from any WADA International Standard in the analysis of the Player's Sample.
- [9] By letter dated 21 December 2022, the Player was given formal notice that he was being charged with two anti-doping rule violations, namely a breach of Regulation 21.2.1.1 and a breach of Regulation 21.2.2.1 of the Rules on the basis that two metabolites of Oxandrolone were present in the Player's Sample and were Used (the "ADRVs").
- [10] The Player was notified that it was World Rugby's position that the ADRVs were intentional under Regulations 21.10.2.1.1 and 21.10.2.1.2 of the Rules and that World Rugby would be seeking a four-year period of Ineligibility.
- [11] The Player was also informed that if he accepted the occurrence of the ADRVs and the consequences of the ADRVs, then the four-year period of Ineligibility would be reduced to three

years under Regulation 21.10.8.1 of the Rules based on his early admission and acceptance of sanction.

- [12] The Player admitted the ADRVs and waived his right to a hearing. The Player has accepted the associated sanction of a period of Ineligibility of four years from all rugby activity at all levels, pursuant to Regulation 21.10.2.1 of the Rules, but with the four-year period of Ineligibility being reduced by one year pursuant to Regulation 21.10.8.1 of the Rules. The Player also acknowledged that under Regulation 21.10.8.1, no further reduction in the period of Ineligibility shall be allowed under any other Regulation.
- [13] Consequently, the Player is sanctioned to a period of Ineligibility of three years. In accordance with Regulation 21.10.13.2.1 of the Rules, the period of Ineligibility runs from the date of the Player's Provisional Suspension on 15 September 2022, ending at midnight 14 September 2025.
- [14] Any results of the Player between 14 August 2022, being the date of the AAF, and 15 September 2022 when the Provisional Suspension was imposed have been Disqualified in accordance with Regulation 21.10.10 of the Rules.
- [15] The Player's attention is drawn to the following extracts of Regulation 21.10.14 of the Rules which address the status of a Player during their Period of Ineligibility:

"21.10.14.1 Prohibition Against Participation During Ineligibility or Provisional Suspension

No Player or other Person who has been declared Ineligible or is subject to a Provisional Suspension may, during a period of Ineligibility or Provisional Suspension, participate in any capacity in a Competition or activity (other than authorised anti-doping Education or rehabilitation programmes) authorised or organised by any Signatory, Signatory's member organisation, or a club or other member organisation of a Signatory's member organisation, or in Competitions authorised or organised by any professional league or any international-or national-level Event organisation or any elite or national-level sporting activity funded by a governmental agency.

•••

A Player or other Person subject to a period of Ineligibility shall remain subject to Testing and any requirement by World Rugby to provide whereabouts information.

21.10.14.2 Return to Training

As an exception to Regulation 21.10.14.1, a Player may return to train with a team or to use the facilities of a Union, Club, Rugby Body or other member organisation of World Rugby, an Association or a Union during the shorter of: (1) the last two months of the Player's period of Ineligibility, or (2) the last one-quarter of the period of Ineligibility imposed."

- [16] The Player remains subject to Testing by World Rugby during his period of Ineligibility.
- [17] This decision is final, subject to referral to a Post Hearing Review Body (Regulation 21.13.7 of the Rules) or an appeal to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (Regulation 21.13.2 of the Rules). As regards a Post Hearing Review, the Player has seven days to make this appeal in accordance with Regulation 21.13.7.2 of the Rules.
- [18] As regards an appeal to CAS, the Player has 21 days to appeal in accordance with Regulation 21.13.6 of the Rules. The Player is considered an International-Level Athlete for the purposes of
